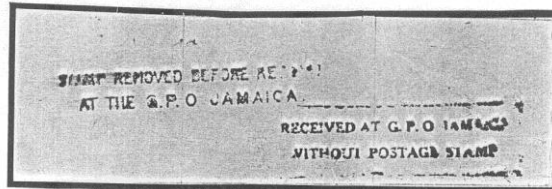

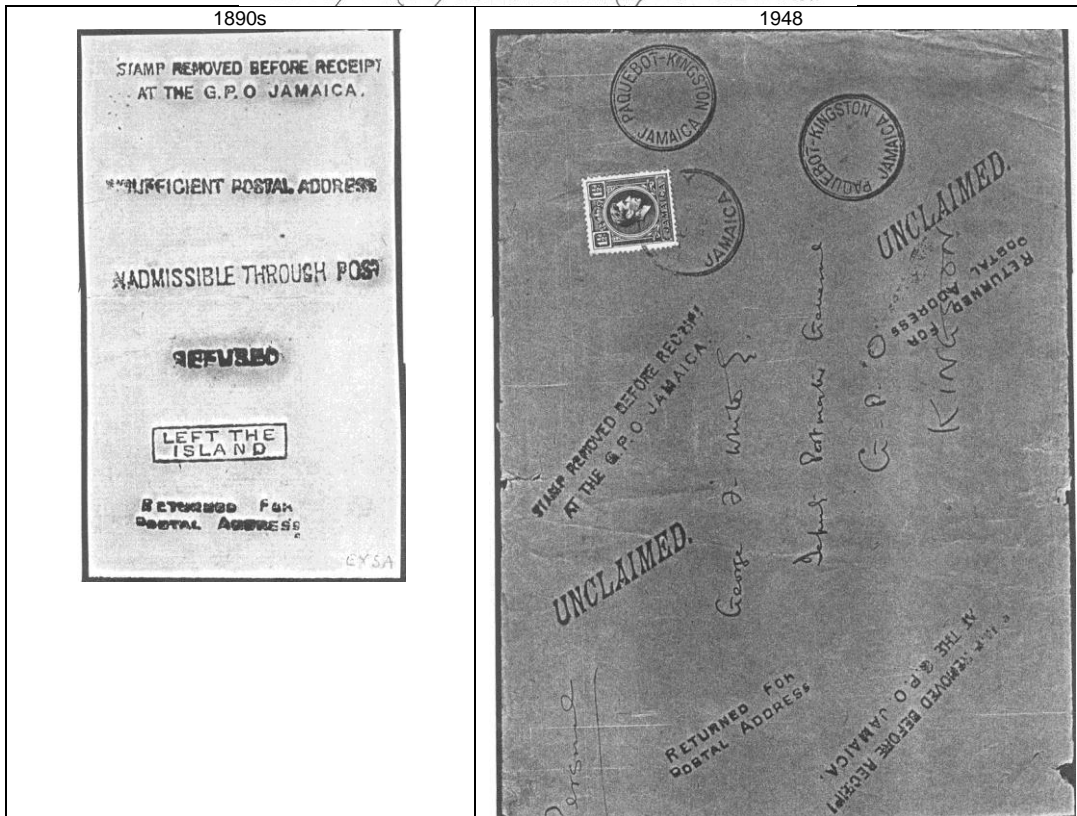
## 2.2 Underpayment Text Classic Period

The following courtesy strikes were obtained in the 1890s and 1948.




*Courtesy strikes of instructional markings as used in 1891*

### 2.2.2.1 UPSR-DM04 'STAMP REMOVED BEFORE RECEIPT / AT THE GPO JAMAICA'

	This handstamp is shown on the sheet of proof strikes c1890, it is in heavy sans serif type, 3 mm in height. It is also present on the 1948 courtesy sheet.

Little is known about this strike, as no examples have been recorded, but it is possible that it was designed to explain why it was necessary to impose a penalty. The theft of postage stamps from letters posted in remote places prior to their introduction into the mainstream postal system was wide spread in areas of extreme poverty.

An odd ‘coincidence’ that the 8 Jan 1844 EKD quoted is the same as the cover with hyphenated mark – This EKD must be treated as suspicious.



### 2.2.4 UPDP Detained for Postage

#### 2.2.4.1 UPDP-D02 – ‘No / Detained for Postage’

<i>No Detained for Postage</i>	An unframed double straight line brass handstamp with legend "No / Detained for Postage" in upper and lower oblique case fancy script lettering 2 mm and 5½ mm in height with overall measurement of 45 x 11 mm. The abbreviated "No" for "Number" placed at left to allow for insertion of a m/s number by a P.O. official.

In the absence of a reciprocal postal agreement with a foreign country, the British Post Office refused to allow letters to pass from its possession unless all postage due to the British Post Office had been paid. Where this had not been done, the letter was handstamped with UPRL-D-03 and returned to the sender for the additional postage, the amount required being added to the handstamp in m/s.

This action was not always possible, especially when a letter originated in a foreign country and in that case, the letter was handstamped with this type and detained at the post office until the necessary postage had been paid. An advice note was then sent to the sender or his local agent if known, telling him that a letter had been detained at Kingston for further postage, and that on quoting the number on the advice note which corresponded with the number inserted in the handstamp on the letter, and paying the additional postage, the letter would be sent on its way.

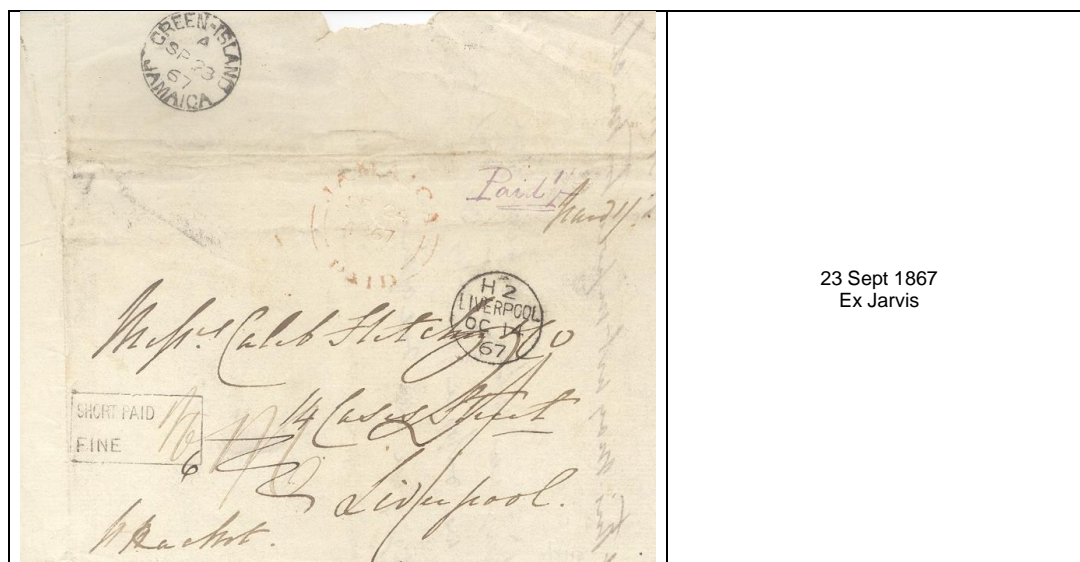

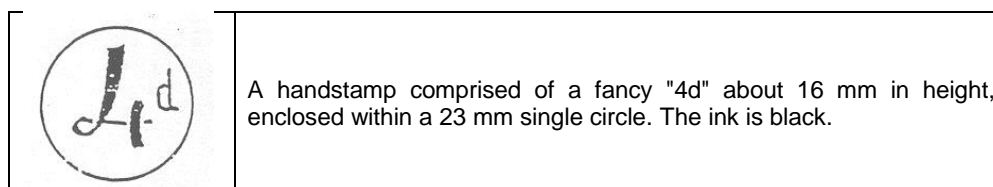

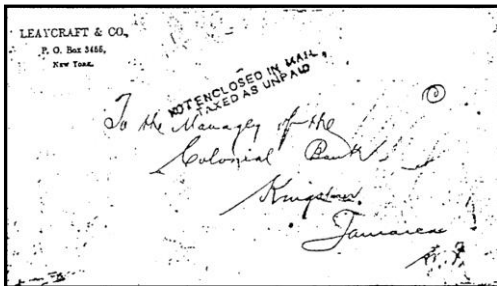
The only example recorded is reported to have been applied to an underpaid letter from Jamaica to England, accompanied by a single triangular D05 tax mark. Confirmation outstanding.

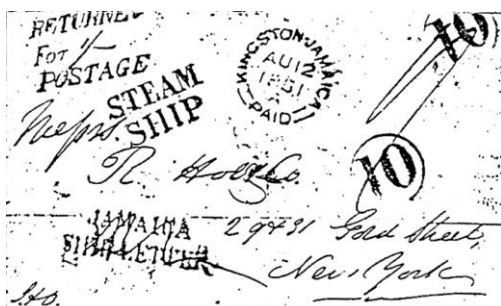

Proud illustrates UPRP-D03 but quotes a date of 26 Jun 1854 which is the cover for mark UPRP-D03a (which is not listed by him).

Such markings can be found on letters bearing unofficially bisected postage stamps which had been returned to the sender for the correct postage. A pre-adhesive example follows:

 After reposting at the GPO on 12 Aug, Type SL5 was crossed out and the Paid dater D6 was applied to show that all the British postage had been paid. It arrived at St. Thomas on 19 Aug and was forwarded to New York by US Mail Contract Steamer. Upon arrival it was handstamped 'STEAM/SHIP' and '10' (cents), the contract charge paid by the recipient

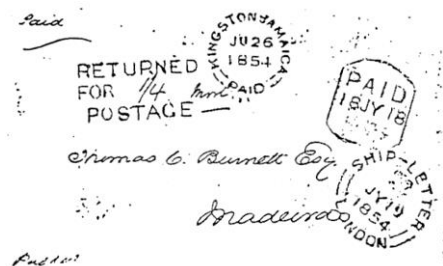


Only one example is known, struck on a letter from a Kingston merchant to Madeira on 26 Jun 1854 in red ink.



Letter was underpaid and was returned to sender for 1/4 'more' postage. Paid 26 Jun 1854 and covering mark PD6a applied; item going forward on month-end Packet of the same date, arriving London 18 July 1854, and Tombstone 'PAID / 18 JY 18' affixed. Circular 'SHIP-LETTER/LONDON' added following day.

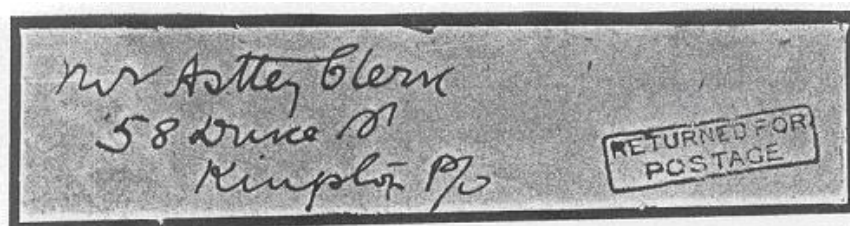

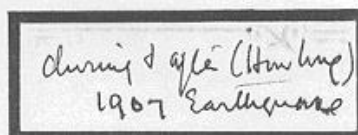
This mark will possibly remain an enigma. Part of Astley Clerk's own collection, and addressed to his home, accompanying it is a small piece of paper bearing his notation which reads 'during & after the 1907 Earthquake' Date of despatch to Jamaica unknown, but it was necessarily prior to 1907.

Reports of that era would indicate that no special arrangements were needed during the earthquake emergency, nevertheless it is apparent that some individuals attempted to pass unfranked items through the post. The absence of a space for m/s insertion would indicate that the handstamp was intended to be used differently, though in what way has yet to be discovered. By this time, the necessity of returning letters for unpaid postage had passed. With Astley Clerk's reputation as a serious postal historian, and the fact that the piece is address to him, there would seem little reason to doubt its authenticity, sadly, it remains the only example yet recorded.

Foster stated that no special postal arrangements were necessary because of this emergency but it is possible that some individuals attempted to pass unfranked material through the post.

Records show that, at 3.35 on the morning of 14 January 1907, the island woke up to devastation caused by a very severe earthquake. Kingston suffered great damage, most buildings suffering some damage, many being completely destroyed. A temporary Post and Telegraph Office was set up at Blundell Hall, in East Street, where, it is said, clerks set up tables under the shade of a tree, to conduct post office business. With the apparent breakdown in public services, albeit on a temporary basis, opportunists are said to have posted letters without stamps, saying it was impossible to purchase them. It would seem the Postmaster caused this handstamp to be made, and used, to return unstamped mail to the sender.

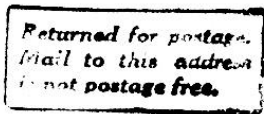

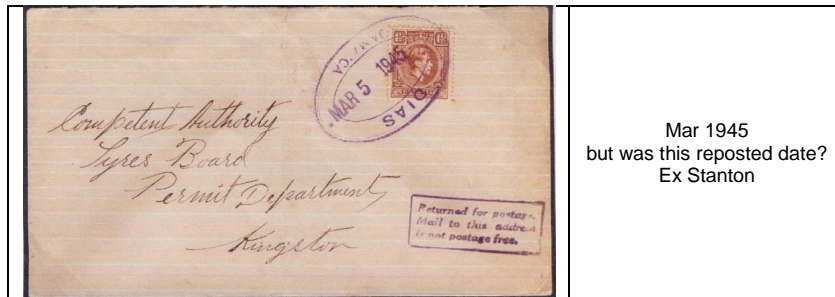

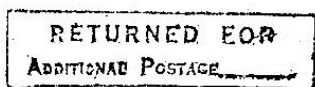

A double straight line rubber handstamp with legend: RETURNED FOR / Additional Postage \_\_\_\_\_ enclosed within a single rectangular frame measuring 50 mm by 12 mm. Serif lettering with the top line in 2½ mm caps, and the lower line 3 to 2 mm upper and lower case, with a blank space after "Postage", also a 12½ mm straight line base for the insertion of a manuscript AMOUNT DUE.



Foster identified two variants of this handstamp with slightly different spacing.

Normally used on International Air Letters, but also known in surface mail service.

Post Office regulations required that airmail correspondence should be fully prepaid or it was liable to be sent by surface mail or otherwise delayed.

The practice of returning ‘Air Mail’ for additional postage does not seem to have carried out very thoroughly and it was probably more convenient to apply ‘Additional Tax markings’.

Foster says that the reason for the use of this handstamp is not apparent, since its use on surface mail would be a reversion to a practice abandoned before 1900.

It has been seen on letters to destinations outside the island (England, Australia U.S.A. etc) and also on inland mail. In all cases the 'missing' postage has been added by the sender.

Foster believed that it may have been confined to underpaid mail originating from large business houses in Kingston which was easily returned to the sender for additional postage, but this was only a supposition.

The amount required (in pence) was inserted in m/s in the space provided on the handstamp. In many cases the stamp required is stuck over the handstruck mark, letters are known as such sent back to the office of origin from Kingston with the additional stamp postmarked with the postmark of the office of origin.



Kingston MSR applied and cover was despatched via air mail on ? Aug 1972.

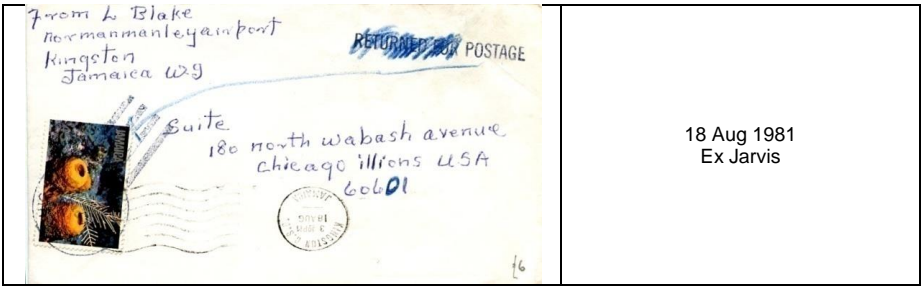

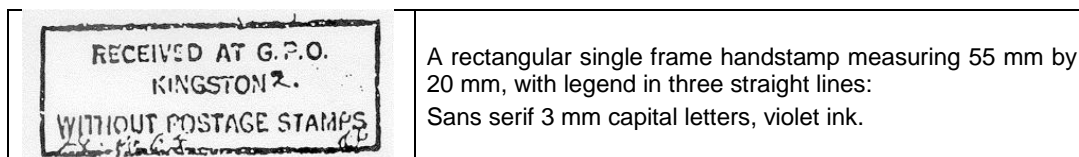

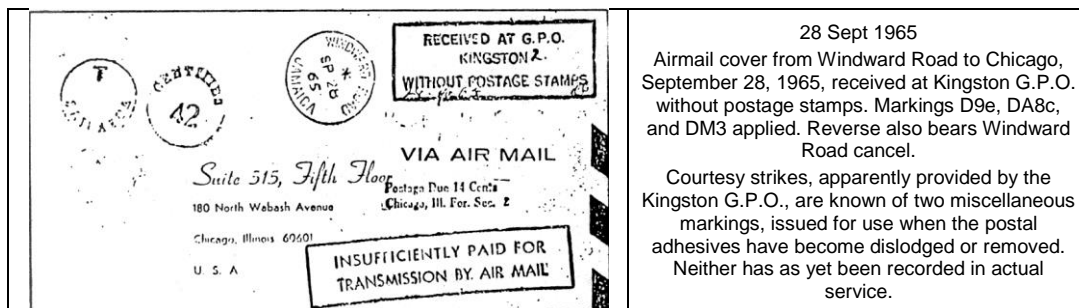

The only example of this handstamp seen to date is struck on an unstamped letter (see below) to the U.S.A., probably posted in Kingston.

The handstamp was almost certainly applied at Windward Road Post Office, which comprised Kingston Postal District 2, as the specimen seen has a m/s 2 inserted after the word KINGSTON. Foster says, it is logical to assume therefore, that the other Postal District Offices in Kingston have similar handstamps to this and it will be interesting to see whether further examples carry a m/s Postal District number.
