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JAMAICA LABELS

Many Jamaican collectors are not aware of the wide extent of labels used in this Island over the past fifty years. .One can form a very interesting and varied collection of these.

The very first label which we have on record was in 1908, a small stamp of 23 x 28 mm. printed in red, white and blue, in the middle portraying the Union Jack and around the flag in a double circle ring "Buy Goods of (around top and around the bottom of the circle) BRITISH MANUFACTURE." The outside frame is in red. Postmarked Kingston – February 25, 1908. These are very scarce, and only rarely do they ever turn up.

The British Red Cross Society in Jamaica issued five labels during the 1914-18 War. These labels, although not authorized for postage, were accepted and sold by the Post Office over the counter to help boost the War Fund.

If one has the opportunity of collecting many hundreds they can be found in many flaws and errors. All the labels generally speaking are of a similar size of 22 x 28 mm, illustrating one of the early 'planes flying above the clouds with the big red Geneva Cross at the bottom. All the first printings were done as above in red. They can be found along with the normal postage stamp of that period tied to the postmark. These are becoming very scarce. The second printing which came out around 9 months later in 1915 shows a similar design as above, but with the word 'Jamaica' just above the Geneva Cross. Jamaica is printed in black. The third printing was done shortly after, and Jamaica appeared under the aeroplane in between clouds. Again in black.

Many copies can be found where the word 'Jamaica' is across the aeroplane and above the aeroplane almost an the frame. While the fourth printing shows the same design with the word 'Jamaica' once again just above the Geneva Red Cross and printed across the Geneva Red Cross is the word '½d.' Both wording in black. The fifth printing is very similar to the second except that the word 'Jamaica' appears in red and not black. There is to be found quite a variety of shades varying from deep red to carmine. This organization was able to purchase a number of 'planes and helped considerably during this period.

In the 1939–45 War the Jamaica Red Cross Society again issued labels, and these were distributed and sold in large amounts and helped form the Squadron named after the Island – also part of the proceeds went towards the Fund. These labels of the 1939–45 Issue are 22 x 28 mm framed with the word Jamaica at the top and the words WAR FUND at the bottom with the large Geneva Red Cross filling the rest of the stamp. These are almost as scarce as the first Red Cross labels of 1914–18.

Also at this period Mr. Cargill organized a Fund known as the Fellowship of the Blowers. These labels were issued to each member who had to pay either a ½d, 1d, upwards depending on how many 'planes were destroyed each month. This organization collected a very large amount particularly towards the last months of the war.

The third label to be issued for 1939–45 War was the St. Dunstans which is the same size as the above 22 x 28 mm framed with the words "HELP THE WAR FUND" printed in red at the top of the stamp showing the Tomb – framed with the word St. Dunstans across the Tomb, and the bottom of the Tomb, the word Jamaica B.W.I. All this is in black except for the frame which is in red. These are extremely scarce even more so used.

Many collectors do not realize that the War labels can be found in booklets. These booklets were prepared and printed in Jamaica and contained 12 War labels of the fourth printing. With interleaving of advertising by different firms in Kingston.

On the cover the advertisement – Adolph Levy and Bros. for Corn Oil. The second page has J. Wray & Nephew Ltd. – Wine and Spirit Merchants – Finest of Jamaican Rums. There is then 6 labels of the Red Cross – fourth printing.

On the following page advertisement by Fred L. Myers and Sons followed by an advertisement by the Jamaica Mutual Life Insurance Society. On the following page there is an advertisement to use the ½d labels on your letters going through the mails so as to help the Worthy Cause which these labels were being sold for. On the back of that page was an advertisement by Cecil deCordova & Co. for Golden Glow Milk, and then another 6 Red Cross labels. The advertisement on the following page is for Machados Cigarettes while on the back of that is Charleys of 64 King Street. On the cover inside Sherlock & Smith of King Street, and on the back of the folder was an advertisement of Fred L. Myers & Son. The whole booklet containing only 12 War labels, selling for 6d. per booklet.

One understands that there were also other earlier booklets, but these have never been seen or recorded. This is the first occasion that this booklet is being recorded.

The cover is in a greyish colour, usual size prepared by the Gleaner Company.

Certainly very rare items for any collector to find.

If any collectors are able to get large collections of these labels, they will certainly find some very interesting varieties and shades.

NOTES HERE AND THERE

JAMAICA Jamaica will be having a Girl Guides issue from reports currently rumoured in Kingston, but no official Notice has been forwarded.

TRINIDAD The Girl Guide set for Trinidad is due out in August. The release date will be announced in the next couple of weeks.

Jamaica Almanac

Many readers have never had the chance to read or see any of the old copies of "The Jamaica Almanack" which was issued between 1800 to 1870. The 1845 edition has some very interesting postal facts.

The G.P.O. Headquarters was located at the N.E. corner of lower Church Street, and Port Royal Street. The list of Royal Mail Steam Packet boats were as follows:

Avon - Clyde - Dee - Forth - Medway - Severn - Tay - Teviot - Thames - Trent - Tweed - City of Glasgow - Schooners - Lille - Leo - Larne.

Passage to Southampton from Jamaica – Single After Cabin £50; Single Fore Cabin £45.

Railway / Motor TPO

The Motor Mail Services still continue, although nowadays they have been modernised and greatly extended to cover larger areas of the Island, and a small number of passengers are carried on each coach. Their schedules still continue to connect with the Railway Time-table and are maintained between:

In the lists which follow, the Railway Station Postmarks have been given the designation 'S' whilst those of the Travelling Post Offices carry that well known prefix 'TPO'. Earliest and latest known dates of use are given in all cases, but there is little doubt that many of these records of the writer can be extended.

NOTE Editor W.I.S. - In many cases earlier or later dates are known, many of these dates have been altered. (FFS = Fred Seifert, EA = Everard Aguilar).

RAILWAY STATION POSTMARKS TYPE "S".

In the B.W.I.S.C. Bulletin of July 1959 (Page 54) Lt. Col. F.F. SEIFFERT described a railway marking in his possession which is the only example known to the writer either by sight or reference.

The handstamp is struck in black ink on the obverse of a cover dated 21st December 1880 which also carried the Kingston postmark, and reads:

RAILWAY LETTER BOX SPANISH TOWN

Its dimensions are 46 x 9½ mm. with letters 3 mm. in height but further details are not known to the compiler.

It can be considered certain that this first type of railway markings was issued to postmark letters posted in the new Receiving Boxes at Railway Stations, as mentioned in the Notice of 1st August 1878 (see Page 3). If this theory is correct, and it would seem reasonable, then it can also be assumed that Kingston and possibly Old Harbour were also issued with a similar mark at the same time. Nevertheless, only the Spanish Town mark has been recorded.

SPANISH TOWN 21st December, 1880.

TYPE "S1"

A double-lined postmark which has the name of the town at the bottom and the legend "JAMAICA RAILWAY" at the top, with the date in the centre in three lines.

The lettering is usually small and square and there is a dot on either side of the postmark separating the lettering.
