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

Editorial

Jamaica TRDs

The Temporary Rubber Date stamps for Jamaica are extremely popular, and the modern types from 1939 onwards can become extremely confusing and difficult to new collectors.

So as not to cause too much confusion, the same listing that was in the Philatelic Handbook of Jamaica has been listed. The following types and their varieties are as follows:-

Type 32-which was in use between 1939 and 1940 was a singled oblong of varying size. While type 33 and 33a elliptical which does . not snow the word JAMAICA, this is one of the few T.R.Ds of the modern trend for this Island which does not have this word.

Type 34 are unframed items of which there are only 2 so far listed. Type 35 is an elliptical of 48 X 32. Likewise type 36 has very distinct slanting serif letters around the top and sans serif letters for the word Jamaica.

In Type 37 there are a large number of these marks which vary from sans serif letters to block type letters, and vary in size from 46-50 mms. by 30-34 mms. It is quite possible to break this group down into sub classes but many collectors are going to be very confused by the various numbers of these classes. Therefore this has not been done.

Type 37a is identical to the listing as the date line is in small lettering. Type 37b the date mark is in large lettering. While 37c is of a type very similar to 37 but smaller in size being 46 X 30 on the average.

The word Jamaica can be found either widely spaced across the bottom or very tightly closed and these have been indicated in the listing. 37D is a distinct type having the letters B.W.I. after the word Jamaica. Type 37da elliptical 56 X 40 the word Jamaica B.W.I. in very small 2 mm. block letters. This new type has recently appeared for Maverley either side of the elliptical has a star by the inner circle. While 37db elliptical of 52 X 33 in heavy block letters and without the inner circle, with a star on either side of the elliptical. Both these new types have recently come into use.

Thompson Town being an emergency was only used for a short while. Type 38 is of heavy serif letters, with an elliptical with centre ring, the only mark known for this type is Silver Spring. While 39 is a distinctive type of serif letters for New Green and Nine Turns.

Type 40 -the lettering is very small. This is known for only Mount Moreland in the elliptical. The elliptical without the single ring with various settings are 41, 41a, and 41b.

Type 42 which has a very distinctive edging, the lettering is in $2\frac{1}{2}$ " serif type. There is a star either side of the elliptical, while 43a of the same type, but has a cross either side of the word Jamaica.

Type 43 is a similar type with the very distinctive edge, which is known for a number of Post Offices. While 43a is the same type, except that there is a cross either side of the word Jamaica.

Type 44 is an extremely small type with the elliptical with the very distinctive edge. The name of the Post Office and the word Jamaica appears to be type written. Marks such as Briggs Park, has been put to Miscellaneous 31c.

The circular marks have been listed in one group. The individual listing of each type will be done in the latter part of next year, through this magazine with full illustrations of each type.

If readers would like the type 37 broken into small sub types this can be done but the editor strongly advises against it.

Pricing of these marks has been done for the first time, and this has been based on the actual supply and the length of the Postal Agency or Office being opened.

The value of each cover has been taken into consideration. Nowadays many marks are issued without the slightest warning, and it is not until months later, that these are caught up while going through, commercial material.

In the modern type Alva and Innswood both had very short lives, and no TRD's were distributed from this end. While Thompson Town was not known of.

There is a reported second type for Galina but this has not been seen. The prices have been checked over, with two other local specialists and this will give a very clear indication which are the rare items and which are the common. This list is made up until October 1956 and listed to be released are two more T.R.D's between November and March of next year.

Miscellaneous Types T.D. 31a "RETURN LETTER BRANCH"

This T.R.D. is an oblong 42X28 mm. with "RETURN LETTER BRANCH" in small letters at the top of the oblong - the date appears in the middle, and Kingston Jamaica at the bottom. Many of the strikes are very indistinct.

Earliest known date August 17, 1922. Latest known date June 7, 1928.

TD. 31b

An oblong 52X30 mm. which has "RETURN LETTER BRANCH" with the date in the middle, and Kingston, Jamaica at the bottom in block letters 1½ mm only two envelopes are known.

Earliest known date May 1924.

Latest known date April 21, 1927.

T.D.31c

An oblong 61X40 mm. with "1st CARIBBEAN - JAMBOREE" date appears in the third line - BRIGGS PARK - JAMAICA. With the boy scout badge in the top left hand corner. Always in purple.

FIRST DAY OF ISSUE 5 MARCH 1952. LAST DAY OF ISSUE 14 MARCH 1952.

Notes Here And There.

Cayman Islands – SG1 used 24 Nov 1900

Mr. F. G. Freeman, of Canada, writes in that he has the Cayman Island Queen Victoria SG 1 on postal used, showing the distinct date of November 24, 1900. There is little doubt that these stamps were on sale for quite a period before the official date as listed in Stanley Gibbons.

Turks Island – QEII Issue

The new Queen Elizabeth stamps for Turks Island are well advanced, and these should be released early in the coming year. The editor has assisted in the preliminary designs. The values are as follows:-1/2d similar to the 1/4d value of previous issues. The 1/2d, 1d, 2d, 21/2d, 3d, 4d, 6d, 8d, and 1/-, is of a series of very attractive designs. The high values are not quite in keeping, and these should have been improved. But the collectors will find the low values certainly a great improvement and far more pleasing than the stamps recently issued in Jamaica.

Jamaica – 1956 QEII Issue

November 15th, release of four stamps the 8d Blue Mountain Peak, the 1/- Hope Gardens, 1/6d Rio Grande, 2/- Fort Charles. Little comment is necessary as collectors must have seen these already.

Jamaica – Booklets (No News)

No news as yet re the booklets. These seem to have been delayed until early in the coming year.

Jamaica – Single Ring Postmarks

Latest single ring Postmarks put into use around the 10th September are as follows:-

Bonny Gate-Grange Hill-Montego Bay (6) Cockburn Pen (6)-Clonmel (2)-Rock River-Islington (2)-Shirley Castle (2)-Lime Hall (2) Annotto Bay (3)-Williamsfield (2)-Thompson Town (2)-Morant Bay (2)-Harkers Hall (2)-Rock River-Oracabessa-Bonny Gate.

NOTE:-ft's interesting to see a small Post Office ordering steel dies for Cockburn Pen-name now changed to Hagley Park-These will most likely never be put into use.

Jamaica – 1956 New TRDs

New T.R.D's coming into use:-

- G.P.O. Maverley Housing Estate-Jamaica B.W.I. name changed to Maverley with very small Jamaica, B.W.I. A star either side of the elliptical (a new type).
- Hagley Park, Jamaica. B.W.I. replaces Cockburn Pen.
- Rock Hall Jamaica B.W.I. New Postal Agency just opened.

All the above are in St. Andrew.

- Treadways, Jamaica. B.W.I. St. Catherine, replaces Bermaddy.
- Porters Mountain, Jamaica. B.W.I. Westmoreland. This type has only been in use a short while, can be seen in purple-purple/black and black. Strikes are mostly most indistinct. Strikes in black appear like 37E.
- Sawyers-Jamaica, B.W.I. Trelawney.

Jamaica – Early Postmark Enquiries

There have been several enquiries re the early postmarks of Jamaica up to 1890. These will be done in the near future. Handbooks by the late L. C. C. Nicholson, are available with these marks. 3/6d.

Bermuda -- Bermuda Yacht Race Variety

Mr. Josh reports a very interesting variety in the Bermuda Yacht Race with the letters "ACE" missing from the word RACE, in the ,1/3d value.

Bahamas – Cat Cay TRD

From 1936 on through to 1941 I lived on a little Cay in the Bahamas Islands. It was a Cat Cay, and is rather a famous resort for marlin and tuna fishing. It is owned by a Mr. Louis Wasey and he has made a splendid and lovely Cay that was once nothing but coral and coconut palms. However, I am not trying to sell Cat Cay. I would like to tell you this little story which is absolutely authentic. I personally know these people.

On the more inhabited Islands and Cays that comprise the Bahama Islands, the Government in New Providence appoint men to the post of collectors of harbour fees, customs, telegraphic communications and in some cases they dispense the law. All these positions are filled by one man, so you can imagine they are busy chaps. John Saunders was our official on Cat Cay. The manager of the Island was Mr. Cook, affectionately known as (you guessed it, COOKIE). His daughter, Miss Evelyn Cook, was his secretary, and Mr. K. C. B. Smith was the architect in rebuilding the Cay. Well, seeing that it was a Fisherman's Paradise and marlins, blue and white, were the game fish. Evelyn Cook designed a marlin head and K. C. B. Smith sketched it out, and it was sent to Nassau to be approved. The powers that be gave it their blessings and it came back to Cat Cay as a rubber stamp, so as the mail went out, Johnny emblazoned the marlin head on the George VI stamps. Of course the mail was then transferred to Nassau and the letters received the Nassau cancellation, so if anyone has any of these cancelled stamps with the marlin head, they will know that it came from Cat Cay, a small paradise that is half mile wide by three long. They also have an emblem on the Flag of the Island that depicts a cat standing on a key. I believe that the marlin head strike has been discontinued since the war, at least that is what John Saunders tells me. He is now a resident in this country and is forever home in his dreams of Harbour Island where he was born. I hope this is of interest

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UP TO DATE

Before the advert, of mail carried by air, this placed oversea collectors under a great disadvantage. Now however all this has changed and wherever you live, you need only be a day or two behind London, if you subscribe to the Commonwealth Courier.

This is a little monthly which deals exclusively with King George VI and Queen Elizabeth stamps. Each number contains, hundreds of bargain offers (many dealers tuck in here and help themselves) tips, articles and comments, Commonwealth Catalogue additions and price changes, and the findings of an expert panel of philatelists on all Crown Agent's releases.

A years subscription of the special air mail edition costs a mere 10/- and thousands will affirm that a King George VI and Queen Elizabeth 11 collector could not spend half a sovereign to better effect.

Common Northern (Scandinavian) Postage Stamp

For the first time the five Northern countries, Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden are going to issue a common Northern stamp. The motif for the design, of this stamp derives from a poem of the Danish author Hans Hartvig Seerdorff Pedersen, "Svanerne fra Norden" (The Swans of the North), five swans in flight, symbolizing kinship, and common destiny of the peoples of the Northern lands.

The Association "NORDEN", having as its declared purpose the strengthening of co-operation between the Northern countries, has designed and arranged the production of a special envelope. The State emblems of the five Northern countries are imprinted on these envelopes. Any person wishing to obtain such envelopes together with a complete set of the above mentioned Northern stamp should write to the address given below and attach an amount equivalent to one US dollar to Birgir Olsson, Foreningen Norden, Vasagatan 52, Stockholm, Sweden.

New Commonwealth Issues

I have been asked by the editor of the B.W.I. Philatelist to write a monthly causerie on newly issued British Commonwealth stamps, and such is my high regards for this fine little quarterly that I am delighted to do so. Maybe it will take a month or two for me to get these comments framed in such a manner that they will be of some interest to readers, but if they will care to express their opinions perhaps I will be able to settle down usefully, all the sooner, and thus we'll all gain thereby.

For the last month or two, new printings released in London by the Crown Agents, have not yielded much in the way of new shades, worth taking up. I should mention that collectors in Britain-and my experience of the tastes of U.S.A. collectors is that they are very similar-are very keen on shade varieties, and I had better explain now, that I will in future be mostly expressing the opinions of the Commonwealth Courier panel, when I refer to new shades worth consideration.

This was a panel I set up to get over, the difficulty, as far as possible, of obtaining opinions which would meet with general approval. It is well known that we all see colours slightly differently, and for me to say off my, own bat, that this and that are good shades, would not do. Consequently I got three experienced philatelists to form a panel. All had their eyes tested (actually two were turned down on this eye test, and two others who passed took their places) and they were given a completely free hand to state what they thought of new printings, as far as shade variations were concerned, and from time to time, I hope to quote from their findings.

During October there were only three releases and these were for Tristan da Cunha ($\frac{1}{2}$ d) Ceylon (4¢, 30¢, 1r) and Falkland Is. Deps. (2d, 4d, and 1/-) none of which are worth referring to, for whilst there were slight shade variations here and there, all were too trivial to merit detailing. As far as we have gone at the time of writing these notes, there have been three short releases on November 7th, for Basutoland (3d) Perlis (10¢) and' Tonga (1d, 2d) I have not seen yet the panel's findings, but I am sure that they will have found nothing to interest them. The Basutoland 3d has the frame a bit brighter, but to no extent.

Next month however I may have a more interesting story to tell regarding these Crown Agents' releases, for there are three for West Indian colonies (Bahamas, British Guiana and St. Kitts) which have distinct possibilities.

On December 1st there are to be two releases of postage dues, (entirely new stamps) for Basutoland and Gibraltar, and this will help to add to the popularity of what were once the Cinderellas of the catalogues. Now postage dues are almost as popular as ordinary postage stamps and whilst on the subject of dues, I should mention that a major variety has turned up for the Catalogue. A complete sheet of Great Britain (CW. PD 17, SG D48) imperf. is being cut up. Seventy pounds a pair is being asked, which speaks for itself, regarding the popularity to which I have already referred.

Cayman Islands

The remaining chapters of the Cayman Islands Handbook -

George V

War Stamps - George VI-Queen Elizabeth will not be appearing in this magazine. This edition will deal with the Postmarks of the Cayman Islands. Any reader that has items not listed - the editor will be only too glad to hear from them.

List of Post Cards known

Queen Victoria - No Post Cards were issued.

June 30th 1908 ¼d brown card measures 121X75 mm. on buff.
¼d yellow brown issued around 1912 measuring 115X89 mm. on buff known unused.
1d red issued Dec. 1909 measuring 139X88 on buff.
½d blue issued early 1914 reported but have not seen.

Envelopes.

Wrappers

only ½d green newspaper wrapper on yellow brown. Measuring 120½ mm. across is known.

Combination Covers

Combination covers are not at all easy in finding, but one does come across these covers from time to time. Many tourist ships which have called at this Colony, would have had a number of letters, cards, etc., mailed Grand Cayman or on the ship, and usually these covers are remailed as soon as the vessel arrives at a large Port. One knows of Combination Covers for the M.S. Gripsholm on a South American Cruise, January 29th to March 24th, 1938, cover with pair 1/4d Cayman 1935 issue, remailed at Venezuela with one stamp of that country.

The R.M.S. Atlantis called at Grand Cayman Feb. 22nd, 1937, being the first large tourist vessel to do so, and found that she could not go into Georgetown, special covers were done on the voyage.

There must be other covers, but the Editor has no further information.

Cayman Islands Postage Dues

Postage due stamps have never been issued in the Cayman Islands but letters short of postage were taxed with the postage stamps of the Colony. For example, if a letter was taxed 1d coming from England this would bear a 1d stamp of the Cayman Islands. This system is still in operation in the 3 Islands.

WW1 Red Cross Labels

During the first World War, Jamaica issued labels of the Red Cross and Aeroplane to raise funds for the varieties of War appeals. These labels which were known; can be found in four different types. It seems that a small amount of these war labels were sent to the Cayman Islands and some of these have been seen on piece and off cover, with Cayman Islands written across the label. Some postmarked and others partly. The writing is usually large and sideways to the 'plane. These are not seen often.

Chapter 10 – First Flights

During the war a Douglas Sea Plane NC14208 called at Georgetown, and carried a number of letters to Miami, Florida, USA. This sea plane was in the care of Captain William Cleveland, the following amount of letters were postmarked the 12th Feb. 1940.

Total mail carried amounted to 6 lbs. 8 ozs. totalling 346 letters, of which 285 letters have the double date postmark. All these covers were transshipped at Miami, Florida. There was no cachet used. Value of these covers \pounds -5. 0. 0.

Cayman Islands Airways Ltd.

Shortly after the war Wing Comdr. Owen Roberts arrived in Jamaica, where he set about forming a small air company known as the Cayman Islands Airways Ltd. With Wing Comdr. Owen Roberts becoming the largest shareholder, three PBY's were obtained, and in 1947 between Oct. and November efforts were made to have an official First Flight. A special rubber stamp was prepared for this first flight from Cayman Brac, and Grand Cayman, and a large amount of covers were done BUT NEVER FLOWN, due to the fact that arrangements were not completed for the carrying of mail, however on its flight from Kingston to Cayman Brac, three covers were flown, while another three covers went on to Grand Cayman. Total of 6 covers for the flight from Kingston to Grand Cayman via Cayman Brac. From Grand Cayman the flight went on to Tampa, but no mail was carried, on leaving Tampa a letter from the Mayor of Tampa, to the Mayor of Kingston was carried. These 7 letters were the only official mail it carried on its first flight.

In 1950 one of the P.B.Y's flew up to Miami for a general check, and on the flight down to Jamaica had to land on a heavy sea and shortly after sank. In the 1951 hurricane in Jamaica yet another PBY was lost thus only one now remained. This Company had for a long time fought to obtain the franchise to and from Cayman, finally this obtained and a Lockheed Lodestar was ordered. The first flight was on the morning of the 10th April 1953, the plane had 11 passengers and a crew of three - among the passengers were Wing Comdr. Owen Roberts, Dr. A. E. Virtue, Derek Wickers. The plane within a minute after taking off, crashed into the sea, about 100 yards off shore. Only one passenger was fortunate enough to escape. This was the ending of CIA.


Mail on this plane was taken to the G.P.O. dried, re-sealed and stamped "FOUND IN BAD CONDITION."

BRITISH WEST INDIAN AIRWAYS now took over the route and on May 29th, 1953 had a flight to Cayman Islands in a Viking. H.E. Sir Hugh Foot was a guest on this flight. Due to very heavy rains, it was not possible to land in Cayman. The following week the flight was carried out - June 6th. First flight B.W.I.A. Cayman Islands to Miami Sept. 10, 1953, mail carried but no cachet.

LACSA for the first time opened up a through service from Miami, Florida, USA. to Panama via Cayman Islands and Costa Rica. No First Day Covers have been reported.

Postmarks For Boddentown



The early history of the Boddentown Post Office is wrapped in mystery. On Feb. 3rd, 1908, the Commissioner wrote that the inhabitants had not all the confidence in it that they might have had, yet on December 18th of the same year it was stated that there was on Grand Cayman no other office than that at Georgetown. In 1909 local letters emanating from the recently opened Boddentown Office were cancelled in manuscript in red ink with the words "Cancelled" "Boddentown," and the date written in American style with the month before the day. Letters from abroad were sent to Georgetown and cancelled there. It was stated soon after, that the obliterator had been sent away for repairs but this seems hardly likely to have occurred at a newly opened office. The possible explanations are (1) that the obliterator had not yet arrived or (2) that this pen cancellation was used on letters on the new local Post between Georgetown and Boddentown before the introduction of the first, "RURAL POST" cancellation. The latter view appears the more probable since it links up well with the recorded dates of this very rare cancellation.


