# News Here And There 

Jamaica -- Obliterators
Some very interesting obliterator numbers have been seen recently, among these have been A 70 type $H$ on the 2d, 3d and 4d Pine, also the $4 d$ CC. A 74 on 2d pine and 1/- CC A 66 on the $4 d$ pine, A 80 on the $4 d$ CA, A 83 on the $4 d$ and $6 d C C$ and $F 3$.

## Jamaica - Brompton / Old Mountain Postal Agency

Brompton Postal Agencies name has now been changed to Old Mountain as from the 1st August. No other new Temporary Rubber Date Marks have been issued for the past few months for Jamaica.

## LONDON:

Reports from London indicate that there is a possibility of an International Philatelic Exhibition being held there in 1960.

## Bahamas - 1957 TRDs

Two new Temporary Rubber Date stamps have just been seen. A double line oblong of $47 \times 36 \mathrm{~mm}$. for Moores Island dated the 21st March, 1957. The date being of a small type hand-stamp. All in black, in block letters 4 mm . high, while the second mark is again a double line oblong with heavy wavy lines on the side, reading United Estates dated the 25th March, 1957. Again a small type of date stamp with Bahamas in black as usual.

## Bahamas - Grand Harbour Shipyard

It is interesting to see that the large shipyard now being built at Grand Harbour, has brought in a tremendous amount of Japanese labour.

## Turks Island - 1957 QEII Issue

The new Queen Elizabeth stamps should be on sale in the Turks Island by October, with the following values:-

- 1d Portrait of Her Majesty in blue grey and carmine
- $11 / 2 d$ Bone Fish-Silver Grey and Tangerine
- 2d Red Grouper-in red brown and olive
- $212 d$ Spiny Lobster-in carmine and myrtle green

- 4d Mutton Snapper in maroon and slate grey
- 5d Permit-in blue green and brown
- 6d Conch-in pink and ultra-marine
- 8d Flamingoes-in red and black
- 1/- Spanish Mackerel-Deep blue and black
- 1/6d Salt Cay-Sepia and blue
- 2/- Caicos Sloop in blue and brown
- 5/- Cable Office in grey and carmine
- 10/-The Dependency badge black and purple.

## Commonwealth News Letter

By J. E. Metcalfe

We were told that most of the countries in the Commonwealth had their Queen Elizabeth sets, some time ago, and ever since we have been busier than ever. Even the Crown Agents, that very excellent Stamp Bureau, take some time to fill orders, which speaks for itself.
The Great Britain overprinted for Morocco Agents and the Persian Gulf, provided a lot of excitement, for some of the stamps were no sooner issued than they were withdrawn. It was obvious that some would be scarce, though how scarce one or two are will surprise those who get a copy of the forthcoming Commonwealth Catalogue, where the numbers overprinted are given. These were of course obtained direct from official sources, so I know they are correct, small as are some of the figures.
Next in the line for providing excitement are the new issues for the Malayan States, which are appearing bit by bit as these lines are being written. I well remember the time when Malayan stamps were very moderate sellers, but there has been a distinct change in this respect ever since it was realized by collectors, what fun there was in the many new printings, of the sets now being replaced. Really fine shades galore, and none of them costing (as yet) more than a shilling or so. Most of them as a matter of fact, only a few coppers.
But I would warn collectors, who are short of any of the shads listed in the Commonwealth Catalogue, to fill up blanks with as little delay as possible, for stocks in dealers' hands are low indeed. That is when there are any at all. I tried to buy, and had a deuce of a job.
Anyhow the new sets will apparently produce a different kind of fun. It will be perforations which will provide it for of the very values already out, whilst there is as yet, only one perforation for each stamp, they differ with the values, for no apparent reason at all. This may account for the ready sale which the new Malayans are enjoying. Another set to be watched is that for Zanzibar. I have seen advance copies, and again, as in the case of Malaya, there are several different perforations, and subsequent printings should be closely watched. Changes are likely.
The Commonwealth stamps of the West Indies are by far the most popular with both American and British collectors. That is amongst those who go in for our new Commonwealth issues, and many are
wondering what will happen when Federation takes place. It has been comforting to those who want the separate countries to continue with their own sets, to note what happened in Malaya, and I have good reason to believe that the same procedure will be adopted by the West Indies, so all will be happy, not least of all the various Colonies themselves, which do very nicely out of their stamps.
There are still repercussions about the Trinidad 1 c "Provisional" and people have a pretty shrewd idea who was behind it all, and who did so well out of it. Let's hope there are no more issues of the same character. This one did Commonwealth Stamps plenty of harm.
It has not been only the Colonies which have been providing the fun. New Zealand has been in the limelight also. It will be remembered that there was a change in the lettering of the $3 / 6$ on $3 / 6$ stamp. A New Zealand dealer wrote me and asked if I could supply a copy. This surprised me, so I made enquiries and found that not only was the stamp obsolete, but only 40,000 copies had been printed in the first place, and of these a number had been withdrawn. Scarce stamp number one. Then the 1/3d stamp (also the "Arms" type) came out with blue lettering, and whilst getting on for four hundred thousand copies were printed, such is the big demand for uses other than postal, that the stamps were sold out in a month or two and most British dealers were apparently too late. So here is scarce stamp number two. In the case of this stamp don't be. misled by the big number printed. As I have said, many are used fiscally and the stamps seem really scarce.
Our own "Jamboree" stamps have not proved very popular, for the designs are the same old heavy uninspired designs. The mixture as before, is how one writer has put it. Dealers were put to a great inconvenience also, for whilst we had been told that the stamps would be overprinted for Kuwait, at the very end news came that the issue was withdrawn. Such is life.

The Bahamas Temporary Rubber Date marks have certainly been very interesting in compiling, as so many have been turning up and I must acknowledge my grateful thanks to Mr. G. J. Raymond, Mr. Wm. M. McFarlan, who has an outstanding collection of these, and Mr. S. G. Hoey.
A revised listing of these marks has been done, and very shortly will be printed in pamphlets.
Certainly one of the most interesting marks must be Cat Cay which has four distinct strikes, and consider that the Cat on the Cay must be the scarcest of these, followed closely by the actual word Cat Cay, across the stamp. '
Any reader who can possibly assist and help with the dates, colour of ink, I will be only too pleased to hear from them.
It will be noted that this list does not 'tie in with the first listing through this magazine, as there has been several new types turning up.

\section*{Jamaica - Urwick Auction Sale}

The Auction sale of May 29th held in London by Messrs. Robson Lowe and Co. disposed of Dr. Urwicks Jamaica collection, which was extremely strong in the pre stamp covers. Throughout the bidding these were very heavily sought after particularly from the American market. Ships letters were also well in demand, and brought good prices. But it was surprising to see that the British Stamps used in Jamaica did not fetch quite as much as was expected. Some of the individual prices realized were as follows:-
Pre Adhesive covers Alexandria 1837 entire sold for \(£ 9\) 10/-While Flint River 1816 cover to London along with another copy sold for \(£ 12\). Lacovia cover of 1783 showing a very fine strike of the Bishop mark was sold for \(£ 20\). While two covers from May Hill fetched \(£ 10\). An entire letter from St. Arms addressed to Scotland sold for Ell. 10/- While Salt Spring an entire letter dated 1790 addressed to London was sold for \(£ 28\). This is an extremely fine item.
Circular stamps 34 entire letters showing the circular date stamps of most of the main towns along with a map was sold for £45. Ship letters from London to Jamaica with packet letter Jamaica was sold for £22. While an entire from Liverpool-Kingston then to Morant Bay dated 1834 with Morant Bay ship letter was sold for £20. This is a very rare item. While a very fine copy of a letter from KingstonScotland showing the unframed commercial rooms Kingston Jamaica was sold for £14. While another cover of 1826 from Kingston-New York with Commercial Rooms in serif capitals was sold for £8. 10/-
In the Great Britain used in Jamaica some of the better items were Grange Hill A \(451 /-\) green off paper with an RPS certificate realised £29. While a \(4 d\) rose A 47 High Gate fetched £.17. A very fine cover of A 48 Hope Bay went for \(£ 21\).
In the regular issue stamps for Jamaica the 1860 pine apple issue block four mint 1d pale blue was sold for Ell, while on piece bisected cancelled A 75 went for R-10. An extremely interesting cover was the bisect on the 2d Tied to a A 30. This was sold for \(£ 25\). The dollar error in the pine apple sold for \(£ 14\). A mint set of single CC on the \(5 /-\) CA was sold for \(£ 15\). The Llandovery Falls 1d die proof ultramarine and black went for £26. while the slavery stamp with both wmks. went for \(£ 44\). A collection of T.R.D. Handstamps from Queen Victoria to the modern George VI varieties was sold for £34.
